

COMPOSER OF THE MONTH - MAY

Johannes Brahms - 7 May 1833 - 3 April 1897 was a German composer, pianist, and conductor of the mid-Romantic period.

Born in Hamburg into a Lutheran family, he spent much of his professional life in Vienna. The young Brahms was forced to play the piano in dance halls to contribute to the family's income as they were so poor. Brahms composed for symphony orchestra, chamber ensembles, piano, organ, voice, and chorus. A virtuoso pianist, he premiered many of his own works. He worked with leading performers of his time, including the pianist Clara Schumann and the violinist Joseph Joachim (the three were close friends). Many of his works have become staples of the modern concert repertoire.

Robert Schumann was so impressed with Brahms' talent when they met that he was inspired to write an essay entitled 'Neue Bahnen' ('New Paths') which gave Brahms a lot of publicity. Brahms met a Hungarian refugee and violinist by the name of Eduard Remenyi (left) in 1850, and was introduced to a whole range of folk and gypsy music that massively influenced his composing style.

Brahms was an extreme perfectionist. He destroyed many early works – including a violin sonata he had performed with Reményi and violinist Ferdinand David. He once claimed to have destroyed 20 string quartets before he issued his official First in 1873. Over the course of several years, he changed an original project for a symphony in D minor into his first piano concerto. In another instance of devotion to detail, he laboured over the official First Symphony for almost fifteen years, from about 1861 to 1876. Even after its first few performances, Brahms destroyed the original slow movement and substituted another before the score was published.

Brahms strongly preferred writing absolute music that does not refer to an explicit scene or narrative, and he never wrote an opera or a symphonic poem.

When he was 57, Brahms announced that he was finished with composing. However, he was clearly unable to stop his creativity - he produced some incredible late-period works, especially for the clarinet, like his Clarinet Sonatas, Trio and Quintet.

MUSIC FOR EASTERTIDE

Music for Easter can be in various forms. Obviously hymns that are sung right up until the feast of the Ascension (26th May) and Pentecost but there has also been a considerable amount of classical music written for this season.

One famous piece is The Messiah by the German born and nationalised English composer Handel. It tells of the Promise of a Messiah, Christ's Passion and his Triumph over Death in an oratorio. Even though *Messiah* tells the story of Jesus — from birth to death to Resurrection and beyond, almost all the texts were taken from the Old Testament — not the New. The work premiered in Dublin in 1742 — at Easter time. In fact, *Messiah* was always intended for Lent. It was the Victorians who moved it to Christmas, to revive interest in that then-neglected holiday. Incidentally, the first London performance was a disaster. The fact that a religious work was being performed in a theatre, not a church, scandalized London audiences. Eventually, when Handel gave all the proceedings from *Messiah* to charity, London came around, but only then.
