The UK Government will host the UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow in November 2021 – COP 26. This will define the course of political action to address climate change in the UK and around the globe.

The Earthshot Prize – Prince William, David Attenborough and leading scientist have teamed up to award five prizes of £1million every year for a decade for solutions to tackle issues facing our planet

Senge Pieh—from Sierra Leone (died 1879). Known for triggering the start of the end of slavery, and freeing slaves who were being shipped to America to work on sugar plantations.

Usain Bolt—not just an athlete! He has inspired many disadvantaged youngsters from Jamaica to accomplish their goals.

HALLOWEEN! - A REMINDER THAT WE ARE ALL CALLED TO BE SAINTS

Halloween has become a highly commercialised event which distracts us from the true meaning of the event. During his visit to the UK, Pope Benedict reminded us all that we are all called to be saints. During his meeting with young people at St. Mary's University, Twickenham, he said:

"I invite you to become saints, I am asking you not to be content with second best. I am asking you not to pursue one limited goal and ignore all the others. Having money makes it possible to be generous and to do good in the world, but on its own, it is not enough to make us happy. Being highly skilled in some activity or profession is good, but it will not satisfy us unless we aim for something greater still. It might make us famous, but it will not make us happy. Happiness is something we all want, but one of the great tragedies in this world is that so many people never find it, because they look for it in the wrong places. The key to it is very simple – true happiness is to be found in God. We need to have the courage to place our deepest hopes in God alone, not in money, in a career, in worldly success, or in our relationships with others, but in God. Only he can satisfy the deepest needs of our hearts."

This Halloween, let us be reminded of this message and take a moment to ask God to help us to seek him on our journey to sainthood.

Black History Month—Mrs Frino's 'Theme of the Month'



Black History Month has been the library theme for October. Students have been borrowing fiction books by a range of authors, as well as reading non-fiction books about Black History.

The process of making sure the library stock represents all our students, which was set well underway by Mrs McMillan the previous librarian, is ongoing. It is not just for one month a year.

Here is a selection of the new titles which have been added to the library so far this term. Some tell the real-life stories of people often forgotten by traditional history books. Some are about modern-day figures and how they have got where they today. Some are fiction books which make the reader think through telling a really good story!

Next month's theme at the library will be '*Non-fiction November*'.





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Covid Update—IMPORTANT—please read

Covid measures will remain in place after half term.

Ahead of the start of half term all students need to complete an LFD test Sunday evening/Monday morning before they arrive onsite on Monday 1st November. Please look out for a survey link which will be sent out Sunday afternoon for all students to log their LDF test result.

Continue Routine LFD Testing

The new Lateral Flow Device tests (LFD) are nasal swab only and are in the process of being distributed to the students, meaning everyone should have enough tests until after the half term break. It is important that they complete a test the day before they return and inform the school via a SurveyMonkey link which will be distributed next week. If a reply has not been sent on the link, then we will ask those students to undertake an LFD on site upon their return prior to returning to class. Routine testing, and getting a PCR if there are signs of ANY symptoms (even if an LFD returns a negative result), is CRUCIAL to our control measures on site.

A reminder of the main Covid-19 Common Symptoms:

- High temperature
- * New, continuous cough coughing a lot, for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours
- * Loss or change to sense of smell or taste

What to do if you or your child has symptoms. If your child has any of the main symptoms of COVID-19, even if they're mild, and even if the LFD is negative—PCRs catch early signs where LFDs do not:

- Get a PCR test (test that is sent to a lab) as soon as possible: Get a PCR test to check for COVID-19 on GOV.UK
 Your child should stay at home and not have visitors (self-isolate) until you get a negative test result they can
- only leave home to have the test.


