We held a two minutes silence on Thursday as a whole school community. Approximately 1200 people stood together outside to contemplate the sacrifices made; sounds such as the cawing of the crows and the wind in the trees, usually inaudible, added to the atmosphere and poignant sense of occasion.

Miss McHugh also led assemblies this week on the theme of Remembrance, including a history of conflicts and reflection that, even today, we are protected by brave men and women serving in our armed services across the globe, often in hostile environments.



We also returned to Mass at St. Joseph and the English Martyrs on Wednesday! This was the first time the church doors have been opened for such an occasion since the start of the Covid-pandemic so this marks areal milestone. Thank you to Fr. Peter for making this possible and to Fr. Antonio for leading the service.

Students in Year 11 attended the Sixth Form Open Evening on Thursday evening as they look ahead to the culmination of their 7-year St, Mary's journey. 
Empowered


Mr Walker will be working with invited students on their English, but others are welcome too. If your child has been absent from school, this might be a good catch-up opportunity for just a few days. If you know they find it hard to motivate themselves, or perhaps your Wifi is not great, or you don't get home from work until late, this might be just the support your child needs on a regular basis.

A small number of students are already invited to homework clubs supervised by LSAs, but these don't cover the full week. If your child attends these, they are welcome to go to F1 on the other days.

Additionally the Library is open from 8.15am until 4.00pm every day, plus on Tuesday and Thursday mornings we have Breakfast Club in the canteen where students can be supported by cover supervisors, LSAs and 6th form helpers to ensure a positive start to the day and an opportunity for revision or homework catch-up- or per-haps to complete and Accelerated Reader test, or just enjoy a library book! There is a delicious array of breakfast options, mostly priced at just 50p or 60p, but there is no requirement to be buying food in order to attend Breakfast Club. Students in receipt of Free School Meals can have financial support with the cost of breakfast. We remember the soldiers who fought and died for our country. Some of the soldiers were as young as 17.






Why do we wear poppies?





HELPFUL COPING **STRATEGIES**

Boys most commonly use physical activity and sports, and technology and video games as a coping strategy. Girls most commonly use music or chatting to friends. There are lots of things that can help boost a young person's wellbeing as well as potentially help them to cope when things go wrong.

Next week is Just Talk week and we will be leading sessions during form time and assembly in line with this campaign. The Hertfordshire campaign aims to make it easier for all of us to talk about our mental health and seek help when it's needed. At the moment 70% of Herts boys and 72% of Herts girls think it's OK to talk about their mental health.

Give: Do something for a friend or relation/ adult. As well as making them feel good, it can make you feel good too!



Fortnite is an online multiplayer "battle royale" game developed by Epic Games, and is playable on Playstation 4, Xbox One, Nintendo Switch, PC and mobiles. It gained popularity in late 2017 and has since become the biggest game in the world, thanks to its rapid and engaging gameplay. As with most games, Fortnite itself is a highly enjoyable and safe experience, but it pays to be vigilant, as the safety is not water tight.

What parents need to know about

BATTLE ROYALE
