Resumé and Eulogy Virtues

Last Friday's 'Thought for the Day' on Radio 4 was delivered by Liz Adekunle – who, amongst other roles, is a former Chaplain to The Queen. She quoted US journalist David Brooks, and his book, *The Road to Character*. In this book he compares two types of virtues: resumé virtues and eulogy virtues.

Resumé virtues are the things that appear on our cv; they help us compete in the world of work: they comprise qualifications and achievements, and signal our status. Eulogy virtues, on the other hand, are what people will say about you when they remember you. They are qualities that Brooks found in those who 'radiate an inner light'. Liz Adekunle spent much time with The Queen and witnessed her taking time and patience to listen to people, and, for example, offering a warm smile and a compliment to a child. These, she suggested, were - examples of eulogy virtues. Eulogy



virtues, as Adekunle goes on to say, are hard to measure but easy to witness. In particular, in the context of the Christian Church, they are what build up the body - the Church community.

Our work here at St Mary's certainly helps to develop resumé virtues in our students, as we strive for them to make the best possible academic progress, but we don't forget the responsibility we have, in the broader sense of education, to help develop eulogy virtues – and we witness them each day in school, in the way our students treat each other with kindness and respect.

It was lovely for me to describe the St Mary's community in this way at this week's Open Evening. What an evening we had! The planned two Headteacher's speeches were booked so quickly that we had to put on a third. There were over 1100 people booked in to the event which also included an opportunity to tour the school site, to experience a flavour of the curriculum offer and, most importantly, to meet members of the school community. Lots of our students were present on the evening – helping as tour guides or working in departments; they were great ambassadors for St Mary's. The visitors seemed very happy with their insight into our school, offering some extremely positive feedback.

Dr Campbell, Teacher of Science




My name is Jessica Campbell and I am a Lead Teacher in the Science Department. Firstly, I wanted to say how thrilled I am to be working at St Mary's; my first few weeks have been fantastic and it is clear we have wonderful students who are kind and keen to learn.

Before becoming a teacher, I was a scientific researcher and completed a PhD in Cancer Cell Biology at The University of Bristol. 


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Curriculum Update

Summer School Cambridge



Some of our current Year 12 students were invited as top achieving GCSE candidates, to apply for a highly competitive online summer school run by Lucy Cavendish College, Cambridge. Applicants had to be on track for at least 5 GCSEs at grades 8 or 9 and write a letter of application explaining why they wanted to take the course and what they could bring to it if selected. These amazing young people completed their applications whilst right in the middle of their GCSE exams and it was fantastic to have 5 of them gain a place.

One of these students, Raul, has written a summary below:

"My summer course with Cambridge was astoundingly interesting and informative, I would seriously recommend considering this course. The course consisted of 3/4 30-60 minute sessions per week which spanned all the way from talking about subjects specifically: such as chemistry, biology and maths; to talking about core skills such as critical thinking, essay writing and importance of sources when taking into account different viewpoints. Finally, it also was very useful for making my A-level subject choices; what skills and experiences I need to possess in preparation for university and also automatically enrolled me into the academic enrichment programme which will further help me to apply to top universities by providing: subject specific courses; university readiness session and subject exploration workshops.

Kit Required:


GIRLS: House top, skort, shinpads, navy socks, gum shield and boots.
