# Seven-Year St. Mary's Journey

The past week has been a busy time for our Year 11 and Year 13 students. They have started their Mock Exams, practising the routines of the formal public exam protocols. They have risen to the occasion and impressed the invigilators with their excellent conduct.

Last Thursday we hosted our Sixth Form Open Evening. It opportunity to wonderful launch was а our post-16 offer to our Year 11 students and to many visitors to St Mary's, who had come from other schools. There was a real buzz around the site as students and parents learned about Sixth Form courses and enthusiastically discussed different options. I look forward discussions in the weeks to further ahead. leading up to the deadline for applications on 9th December. This is an exciting time for our Year 11 students, because they are now making choices about the last part of their compulsory education journey. Whilst I recognise that, for some students, an alternative pathway outside St Mary's is more appropriate to their career aspirations, I hope that the majority of our students will stay into the Sixth Form and complete their key stage 5 studies here.

Also last Thursday, I attended a meeting that was very much about a school journey from Nursery to Sixth Form: a Catholic education provided by the St Francis of Assisi Catholic Academy Trust. This is the Trust comprising St Mary's and seven Catholic primary schools. Together we are a family of schools with a shared vision and a commitment to collaboration for the benefit of the children and families of our communities. There have been regular meetings of Trust school headteachers this term and it has been great to get to know colleagues in the other schools and to be part of planning for the development of this ambitious group. The commitment to collaborative working will be evident in the event we are currently planning: a joint INSET Day on 3rd January. This will see teachers from all eight schools come together to engage in training, led by an external speaker and individuals from each school. It promises to be an excellent day, in which I am sure there will be valuable sharing of expertise between primary and secondary colleagues. This will be another contribution towards the Trust's vision:

Inspired by the teachings of Christ and the example of St Francis, we strive for excellence, cherishing every child in our care as a unique thumbprint of God, enabling all to realise their full potential.

Last year, the school had 55 Year 12 students (current Y13's) complete the Bronze Award and early indications are very positive from the current Year 12 cohort following an Assembly presentation just before the October half term.

The official DofE website is an excellent resource for both students and parents to pick up ideas for the first 3 components . The four components of the award for Bronze are:

- Volunteering: Bronze (3 or 6 months)
- Physical: Bronze (3 or 6 months)
- **Skills:** Bronze (3 or 6 months) (**One** section above for 6 months and the **other two** sections for 3 months)
- Expedition: Plan, train for and complete one Bronze: 3 day, 2 night Expedition

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#### Science Department News...

Below are some pupil statements written by Year 12 students, about what it is like to study Biology, Chemistry and Physics at A level at SMCS.

#### **Biology** by Ezekiel, Year 12

Biology is a subject with a lot of depth, and a broad variety of interesting topics to learn about, that are more detailed than you may be exposed to at GCSE. For example, you may learn about the structure of an animal cell, only to discover that there are more organelles present, each with their own structure and function. Furthermore, we are encouraged to explore topics further in biology, and come across fascinating avenues in the subject. like the mechanisms involved in skin cancer, and how that understanding led to personalised treatments for patients. As the field is so diverse, it is highly likely you will find something that captivates and excites you.

#### Chemistry by Niamh, Year 12

Going into Year 12, I chose Chemistry as one of my options and so far, I have been enjoying it very much. I recommend taking Chemistry if it is something you enjoy as that way, you will get the most out of it over the two years. Chemistry A-Level can provide you with a variety of options for the future, from medicine to engineering to forensic science to teaching, as well as allowing you to look into topics in more depth than GCSE. Chemistry is used in everyday life whether you realise it or not and this will allow you to build the basis of understanding for the world around.



#### Physics

Physics at A-Level provides a gateway to many different opportunities. By allowing you to explore, in depth, how the world around us works, Physics helps us understand the world's processes, and more importantly, answers many questions. By taking this subject, you get to develop practical and problem-solving skills on an independent level, and consolidate any mathematical knowledge as well as making further progress in maths. Physics A-Level is a well-respected qualification - as well as being enjoyable, of course - but is a maths-heavy subject. If you are interested in Engineering, Physics is a vital A-Level to have.









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## **Rotary Youth Design Technology Competition**

#### This week St. Mary's Catholic School entered three teams of product designers in the annual Rotary Youth Design Technology Competition, hosted at Birchwood High School.

This well established and incredibly competitive event offers students the opportunity to work as a team to design and prototype a solution to a complex nationally set design problem. Our students demonstrated their skills in planning, teamwork, design, analysis, development and realisation to solve the problem of sorting a pile of coins into denominations. The coin sorter was required to work independently of any human interaction, reflect a charity theme and sort 1p, 2p 5p and 10p coins into four separate coin collectors which must be easy to detach. Students of St. Mary's undertook this challenge with excitement and produced a range of excellent designs clearly drawing upon their knowledge of iterative design theory as they constantly evaluated and developed their solutions.

All the age group practical projects were tested before the judges with our students explaining their design thinking confidently to an audience in a high pressured environment. After some refreshments the winners were announced during the closing ceremony.



Our Foundation Team of Year 8s were some of the youngest in the competition. The team consisted of William A, Luca E, Hayden B and Harry W who all did fantastically well to come  $3^{rd}$  in their category.

Our Intermediate Team consisted of GCSE Design Technology students Sam M, Henry V, James B and Jacob C who were commended for their presentation, attitude and teamwork.

Our Advanced Team of A-Level Design Technology students returned from study leave especially to represent their school. The team of Daniel O, Jack H, Ben V and Luca C demonstrated great resilience and risk taking in the way they designed a nonfixated solution radically different from anything the judges had seen before. They received many

complements from staff and students of the other schools.

#### stem4 webinars for Parents and Carers Building Self-Esteem and Positive Body Image in Boys and Young Men

This November, youth mental health charity <u>stem4</u> is focusing on supporting the mental health of boys and young men.

Whilst there is a focus on building confidence and self-esteem in girls, boys can struggle with selfesteem too. Boys and young men often have to conform to gender stereotypes which set standards based on 'strength', both physical and emotional, as well as encourage competition and advantage.

Boys and young men often express low self-esteem differently. Some may act out through challenging behaviours, whilst others may 'escape' into distraction behaviours or withdraw.

Parents and carers play an important role in identifying and supporting positive self-esteem and worth. Our webinar this November looks at:

- early warning signs of low self-esteem and self-worth in boys and young men;
- identifying when eating issues might turn into eating disorders;
- management of muscle dysmorphia;
- practical ways in which parents and carers might engage with and address some of these concerns.
