On Monday we dedicated the day to oracy. Each teacher was tasked with introducing an opportunity for a debate in their lessons, so that students could practise their skills in public speaking and putting forward an argument on a given topic. It was great for me to see these activities in action as I toured the school site; for example, from RE - debating issues around baptism - and maths - debating the importance of calculators. The students were very engaged and demonstrated excellent skills in what are very useful life skills.

These will certainly be important to some of our Year 13 students who have been invited to interviews for places at Oxford and Cambridge Universities. Applying to study at these universities is a particularly competitive process and being invited to interview is, in itself, a great achievement. We wish them well.

Thank you to the many parents and carers of Year 8 and Year 9 students who were able to attend the Information Evenings last Thursday. We had a busy evening and some lovely feedback on the event, which I hope everyone found useful.

As we see the school term nearing its end, we have come to the end of the Church's year. On Sunday we celebrated the feast of Christ the King - the last Sunday of the liturgical year. The Gospel reading described the end of Jesus' life on earth - his crucifixion, at which onlookers were jeering and ridiculing him - all, save one of the criminals, who was crucified next to him. This man recognised his own guilt and Jesus' innocence and asked Jesus for his compassion, which was immediately confirmed. We thus end the Church's year with a simple message central to the Catholic faith: that faith in Jesus provides the way to eternal life. Next week we begin a new Church year by turning our attention to the beginning of Jesus' life on earth as we look forward to the celebration of his birth and enter the season of Advent.

Books and Biscuits Afterschool Club




Books and Biscuits Club - Read and Reviews

We are also lucky to receive sets of new books from publishers, via The Reading Agency. Earlier this month we were sent ten copies of 'I Must Betray You', by Ruta Sepetys (Hodder Children's Books).

Here are extracts from two of the reviews, which will be sent to the publisher. Note that the book has mature themes and scenes and is not suitable for younger readers.

Set in December 1989, the story describes a 17-year-old's perspective of communist Romania. He has lived his entire life in fear and the control of the dictator Ceauşescu. His life is completely normal, until his grandfather becomes sick, and an agent offers him medicine to make him better, but he must do a job for him. Cristian has an impossible choice - should he take the offer, and inform on his family, or risk his life, his friends', and his family's lives?

Science Club Fun!



In our Afterschool Science Club we investigated the



It's gooey. It's sticky. We dyed it, stretched it, broke it apart, formed it into a ball and it bounced.

Glue is made from long, skinny, chain-like molecules called polymers. These molecules can slip and slide around each other, kind of like the noodles in a big pot of fresh-cooked spaghetti. That is why the glue is very runny and can flow easily when you squeeze it out of the bottle. When you mix a chemical with the glue, it causes links to form between the polymer chains. This process is called crosslinking. Once crosslinks form, it becomes harder for the polymers to slide over each other, making the glue thicker and creating "slime".



Introducing some of our new staff!




Miss Osho-Williams Teacher of Science


