Executive Headteacher

The school term began last week with our Trust INSET Day. Teachers from all eight schools in the St Francis of Assisi Catholic Academy Trust came together for a day of training, hosted by St Mary's. Highly regarded educational consultant, and former Catholic school Headteacher, Gerard Durcan, was our keynote speaker. He led sessions during the morning, focusing on leadership of the school curriculum, and the afternoon involved a dozen different workshops, led by members of staff from across the eight schools. The whole day involved teachers from different schools working together and there was a real buzz of enthusiastic activity in St Mary's school hall as the 150 participants shared ideas and experiences. Feedback after the event has been overwhelmingly positive and at the end of the day it was lovely to hear expressions of thanks and praise for the event. It was a wonderful first Trust INSET Day - I am sure, the first of many successful events to come.



The day started with a liturgy, comprising scripture readings, reflections and prayers. Within that we prayed for Pope Benedict XVI, who had died just a few days earlier. His funeral at St Peter's in Rome saw a huge gathering of the clergy, religious and the laity. This was a significant event in the life of the Church, and was thus appropriate for us to acknowledge in our Catholic school communities.

One part of this account of Benedict's life struck me as particularly relevant to us at St Mary's. It recounted his visit to the UK in 2010, during which he addressed parliamentarians in Westminster Hall, including the then Prime Minister David Cameron. In his speech Pope Benedict stated his belief that the Church and the Public Authorities can work together for the good of citizens. As a Catholic school, we are at the forefront of this aim, as we work to fulfil the particular goals of Catholic education - everything that the Department for Education promotes for a well rounded education together with the Church's desire to help the young people in our care discern the person that God has created them to be. At St Mary's this is underpinned by love and respect and aims to achieve true human flourishing, modelled on the example of Christ.


## Matt Oldfield, Author ~ Visit to St Mary's!




Matt Oldfield is the writer of the hugely popular 'Football Heroes' series.

120 students in Key Stage 3 have been reviewing the books nominated for the Royal Society Young People's Book Prize.


The shortlist features a range of Science books published last year, but the prize will be awarded in March 2023.





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## **Design & Technology Department**

### Excellence in KS3 Design & Technology!

**Key Stage 3 Design and Technology students** have just completed their first rotation of study in Term one. In this first rotation, students have excelled at designing and manufacturing and have developed their practical skills. See some of our outcomes below:

### Year 7 Block Head Project

A popular project takes students through basic shaping and forming with timbers where they learn about the working properties of this material area. Students also design and develop their ideas to produce a highly creative outcome.



#### **Year 7 Eco Keyring Project**

A new project where students study the impact of plastic usage on our environment and then do some recycling of their own to produce keyrings to raise awareness. Students are also introduced to computer aided design to help them design their keyrings.





#### Year 8 Book Stand Project

A project where students are challenged in multiple DT disciplines; they produce a fabric book rest and experiment with dyeing techniques as well as learning some new woodwork skills to manufacture a frame.

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#### **Year 8 Programmable Money Box Project**

A project where students learn all about electronic systems and how to solder a printed circuit board. Students also learn how to program and input songs into an integrated circuit. Students also designed and manufactured a moneybox casing to house their circuit boards and their money!



### Year 9 Angry Bird & Catapults Project

A project where students refine their textiles skills that they have developed in Year 7 and Year 8 to manufacture an Angry Bird Projectile Cushion! Students are then challenged in teams to apply their understanding on timbers and mechanisms to produce a catapult for their Angry Bird.



### **Year 9 Skyline Aluminium Project**

A project where students study the field of architecture and work with metals to design a recognisable city skyline out of sheet aluminium. Students also work with computer-aided design programs to design and develop a storage tray for the base of their skyline.



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## World Town Planning Day ~ Competition



In November, to celebrate World Town Planning Day Year 10 and Year 12 Geographers designed their own sustainable settlements.

Students were able to utilise their knowledge from the Changing Cities and Changing Spaces topics to create some excellent plans incorporating energy efficiency, public transport and very importantly local communities.

The winner for Year 10 is Oseiwe, and for Year 12 Tobias, with Oliver and Gabby as very close runner ups.

## Thank you for supporting the Catholic Children's Society Christmas Gift Appeal 2022

The Catholic Children's Society has expressed their sincere thanks to St Mary's Catholic School for the wonderful gifts donated over Christmas to help disadvantaged families.

The Catholic Children's Society received tremendous support this year and has been able to help over 1,200 children who would otherwise have gone without at Christmas.

Below are just two examples of the difference this support has made:

**Supporting a family who fled domestic abuse:** A mother and her three young children had fled domestic abuse with only the clothes on their backs and were staying together in one room in a hostel. The father had been the main bread winner and they relied on food banks to get by. At a time when many children were looking forward to Christmas, this mother knew she would have nothing to give her children. **Thanks to your support, we were able to ensure that all three children could open presents on Christmas day.** 

Supporting a bereaved family during the cost-of-living crisis: A mother lost her husband to cancer six months ago. In addition to coping with this traumatic bereavement, she had to face the challenge of bringing up her two young children alone. With no family nearby, she was extremely isolated. Her youngest was just two years old and the cost-of-living crisis meant that their flat was often cold as they struggled with rising energy and food costs. The family faced a bleak Christmas, with no money to help make this a special occasion. Thanks to your generosity, we were able to provide gifts and food for each child. This included toys as well as warm clothes and blankets, hot water bottles and an energy efficient/low-cost electric heater to help keep their home warm.



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## Winter health update - January 2023

For parents/carers and education and childcare settings From Geraldine Bruce, Head of Health Protection, Hertfordshire Public Health

As children return to schools and childcare settings, we expect to see many more cases of flu, COVID-19 and other infections that affect children's breathing (known as 'respiratory infections'). There also continue to be high numbers of scarlet fever cases, which can spread quickly, but can be easily treated with antibiotics. To help us through this term, this leaflet has five simple steps we can take to protect children, minimise the spread of illness in schools and childcare settings and protect others

### Stay home if unwell Infections can spread quickly in schools and other childcare settings. If your child is unwell and has a fever they should stay home from school or nursery until they feel better and their fever has gone. Adults should try to stay home when unwell and consider wearing a face covering to protect others if you do have to go out. Don't visit people in hospitals or care homes if you have a fever, a cold or symptoms of a stomach upset. Keep hands clean It is important to help children understand that keeping hands clean can stop bugs from spreading. Help your child wash their hands regularly at home with soap and warm water. More information here. Catch coughs and sneezes Catching coughs and sneezes in tissues then binning them is a simple way to help stop illness from spreading. Keeping rooms well ventilated will also help prevent the spread of winter illness. Get vaccinated if you're eligible Now is a good time to check your you and your family's vaccinations are all up to date. If you are unsure your child has had all their routine vaccinations, you can check their personal health record (Red Book) or ask your GP. You can also check the childhood immunisation schedule online. And it's not too late to get the free NHS flu jab or nasal spray this year if anyone in your family is eligible. The NHS will be contacting parents of children who have not yet had their flu immunisation. Flu nasal spray clinics are still taking place in some schools this month, or for children aged 2-3, please contact your GP to arrange an appointment.

Be scarlet fever aware

Call your GP for advice if you think your child has scarlet fever. More information about scarlet fever can be found on the NHS website. If you are concerned about a rash that your child has, advice is available here:
