The thing I love about working in a school is that it's such a dynamic environment; there is always so much going on. As a result, the days pass very quickly. In the past I remember talking to students in assemblies about the small amount of time they spend in school. During term time, in a typical week - 7 lots of 24 hours less than 20% of that time is spent in school. Apart from sleep and recreational activities, that does emphasise the importance of homework to support the relatively small amount of study time provided in the classroom. In school the time is filled, not just by lessons, but by a full, well planned schedule of activities: themed assemblies, tutor time activities and extracurricular pursuits. At St Mary's it is clear to see that, every week, excellent opportunities are offered to enrich the educational experience of all our students. As a well organised community, we are good at adapting to change. One change that has taken effect this week is a change of some leadership responsibilities. Mr Palmer has resumed his role as Head of the Maths Department, replacing Mrs Brewin and Miss Velani who had taken on shared leadership at the end of last year. I am grateful to them for their work leading the department during this school year. As a result, Mr Palmer's role as Head of Sixth Form has been taken over by Miss McHugh, a role with which she is very familiar and very experienced. There has been a seamless transition in these roles and students will continue to be well supported in the future.

I have played host to two visitors new to the school this week. Both toured the site during the working day, during lessons and lunchtime, and both were highly complimentary of the welcome they received and the positive atmosphere generated by all in the community. I also welcomed a visit by someone who is no stranger to St Mary's: former student and teacher at the school, Sister Judith Russi. She remarked on how lovely the renovated T block looked, together with the beautifully decorated wall outside the chapel, with its image of St Mary and the school mission statement, and the bible quotes displayed on the floors of the corridors. Sister Judith reminded me of the charism of the school's founders, the Sisters of St Mary of Namur: 'In the simplicity of my heart I have joyfully offered all to God.' This is also displayed outside the chapel. All these additions to the fabric of the school buildings remind us every day that there is something distinctive about our school - a place imbued with the Catholic faith.

Dear Parents

St Mary's School Attendance Flowchart for Parents

At St Mary's we believe children must be at school every day to enable them to learn, thrive and succeed. They cannot learn if they are absent from school, therefore, we aim to ensure that all our children and young people take full advantage of the educational opportunities available to them and will strive to raise standards by promoting the regular attendance and punctuality of our pupils. We believe the foundation of securing good attendance is that our school is a calm, orderly, safe, and supportive environment where our pupils will want to be and are keen and ready to learn. It is essential that all students are present each and every day. Every child should aim for attendance of 96% and above. A child with good attendance is a child that is happy, confident in school, secure and making excellent progress.

The aims of the school attendance policy and procedures are:

- To demonstrate that improving attendance is everyone's business and embed a 'support first' approach.
- To develop and maintain a whole school culture that promotes the benefits of good attendance aiming for 96% attendance or better and is an integral part of the school's ethos.
- To work with pupils and parents to remove any barriers to attendance by building strong and trusting relationships

Please note:

Evidence for a period of absence may be requested and if this cannot be provided absence will be unauthorised. Leave of absence requests for medical appointments must be made 48 hours before the appointment, in writing supported with the appointment card/email/notification. Evidence must be provided for these appointments. Without this evidence, the absence will be unauthorised.

To support you as parents an **Attendance Flowchart** has been created for you to make reference to and the school **Attendance Policy and Sixth Form Attendance Policy** can be found on the school website.

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ST MARY'S CATHOLIC SCHOOL ATTENDANCE FLOW CHART



Daily monitoring of attendance led by the Attendance Officer and Learning Coordinator will involve checking for regular absence patterns and sending home truancy alert for pupils who are absent and no reason has been provided.

PUNCTUALITY: Students who arrive after the registers have closed at 8:55am and not before 9:30am will have their absence recorded as unauthorised unless evidence can be provided.



Attendance Officer and Learning Coordinator will conduct a wellbeing call home to the parent of any pupil who has had three consecutive days off school with illness.



If absence persists and falls below 96% a Letter 1 will be sent (unless the reasons are COVID related or other medical reasons and evidence has been provided)

An individual pupil checklist will be used to support the pupil.

Please note absences will only be classified as authorised where medical evidence is provided and is at the schools discretion.



If absence persists and falls below 93% a Letter 2 will be sent (unless the reasons are COVID related or other medical reasons and evidence has been provided)

The school will consider whether medical evidence for absences may be required.

A meeting will be scheduled with the Attendance Officer and Learning Coordinator for the Parent and Pupil to attend to discuss attendance concerns and complete an individual pupil checklist (Assess/Plan/Do/Review).

Attendance contract will be implemented to improve the pupil attendance. This will be reviewed every two weeks.



If parents or pupils do not engage with the strategies put in place by the school and absences continue and are unauthorised the Local Authorities will be contacted and a FPN application will be submitted.

When 15 sessions of unauthorised absence are reached (this can include absence from a previous term), the school will apply to the Local Authority for Fixed Penalty to be issued.



Pastoral Leads (AHT i/c Pastoral, Pastoral Support Worker and Learning Coordinator) will escalate a safeguarding concern if a reason for absence has not been provided within 48 hours of absence. This will also trigger a home visit by the school.



The Attendance Officer will issue a Fixed Penalty Notice Warning Letter will be issued on the first day of an unauthorised absence within a term.



Any unauthorised holidays taken during term time will lead to a Fixed Penalty Notice Warning letter being issued on the first day of absence. After the second day of unauthorised holiday county will be contacted to request a Fixed Penalty to be issued.

Severely absent pupils – Pupils with 50% attendance or below the local authority and external agencies will be notified. Support will be requested which may include a whole family plan, consideration for an alternative form of educational provision etc. A Service Request Form will be completed by the school

Law Enrichment trip to Chelmsford Crown Court



Last Thursday a small group of Year 12 and 13 students went on a trip to Chelmsford Crown Court to get a first-hand experience of the legal profession in action.

A truly eye opening experience of watching how criminal cases are heard in court and observing the role of Barristers, Court Clerks, Ushers and the Judge.

Three of the attending pupils had previously been in Mrs Knight's Law Enrichment class last year and were able to observe their legal knowledge when it came down to classification of offences and mitigating circumstances taken into consideration during sentencing of criminal cases.

Hopefully the experience will help our students when they take on similar roles for the Mock Trial taking place on 31 January.

Student Report:

My Trip to Chelmsford Court by Chinasa, Year 12

I currently study Sociology, Politics and English literature. I have always had an interest in law from a youthful age. Growing up I have always aspired to become a Barrister and study criminal defense law or human rights and social injustice law. Recently I had the opportunity to be able to go to Chelmsford Court with a few other students and I can say certainly how grateful I am to be able to receive an opportunity like this, not only was this trip an eye opener for me but also gave me a head start as to how the Barristers work in court.



This trip for me was very inspirational. When we first arrived at Chelmsford Court, I did not know what to expect but all I knew was that I was going to enjoy this trip. When we first got there, we were greeted with a very warm welcome from the Judges Clerk. She then proceeded to tell us all the interesting court cases that were taking place on that day. I wanted to visit all the court cases happening on that day but unfortunately due to time we were only able to visit four cases; the first case was on attempted murder which me and the rest of my peers found remarkably interesting and incredibly sad. Whilst we sat there and watched the case going on I made sure I paid close attention to both Barristers in the courtroom and how they presented themselves and as well as how they projected their voice towards the Judge in order to defend their clients. Following the summary round up from each representing Barrister, we were at the point in court where it was time for the criminal who was found guilty to receive his sentence. After having heard all the things the criminal did the Judge came to a conclusion that he deserved 27 years in prison. In my opinion I think it is well deserved for the criminal, it was such an emotional case as we had to see the victim who was nearly murdered distraught in front of us. An exceptionally raw and emotive moment. Seeing how the Barristers behave in court was exciting for me, as that is my dream job when I am older.

I could sit here for days and write about how much I enjoyed this trip and elaborate more on the other cases we were able to see, but I would take up your whole day. Overall, this trip was very eventful, and if I had the opportunity to go again I definitely would, without a doubt, be the first person to put my name forward. Hopefully we are able to have many more trips like this again in the future.


