Today is Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD). It is commemorated every year on 27th January - the date on which the Nazi Concentration Camp Auschwitz-Birkenau, located in Poland, was liberated in 1945. This was one of many such camps located across Europe during the Nazi regime, but this one has become synonymous with the holocaust, with its iconic entrance - a watch tower building straddling the railway line that was used to transport its prisoners crammed into cattle trucks. Six million Jews were murdered during this horrific period of history, together with many more groups of people who didn't conform to an acceptable Nazi standard in terms of their ethnic background, personal beliefs and physical abilities.

Each year there is a different theme for HMD; this year's is 'Ordinary People'. This theme highlights the fact that ordinary people were the victims of the holocaust, as were those who instigated the persecution and those who stood by and watched. As it says on the HMD website, 'In every genocide, those targeted faced limited choices but in every genocide the perpetrators have choices, ordinary people have choices.'

This week's assemblies were led by Mr Bradbury, on the theme of Holocaust Memorial Day. He presented a brief history of the holocaust, with images highlighting the scale of the persecution. Today we were very honoured to welcome a holocaust survivor to St Mary's to share his story with students in Years 11 to 13. Dr Tom Keve led a very poignant session and the students were very engaged and appreciated the significance of the visit. Last term we shared the news that two of our Sixth Form students are participating in the 'Lessons from Auschwitz' project this year. This involves an orientation seminar, a visit to the Auschwitz-Birkenau State Museum in Poland, a debrief seminar and a school project. Several years ago I accompanied two Sixth Form students on this project and it is something I will always remember, as informative, moving and challenging.

HMD remembers not just the horrors of Nazi Germany but also genocide that has occurred since then, in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. As always, HMD 2023 is a reminder to us all that prejudice and the language of hatred must be challenged whenever we encounter them. As Mr Bradbury explained in his assemblies, prejudice can be found closer to home, with recent reports of an increase in anti-semitism in this country. His clear message for our students was that they need to be confident to 'call out' prejudice if ever they hear it - and to remember the values that are core to our Catholic faith: love of one's neighbour, respect for each other's differences and enabling all to flourish.



We run these special days every year to ensure that no student misses out on a wide range of activities and opportunities to learn something new and to inspire them to love learning in its broadest sense.



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KS3 Enrichment Day




Author Matt Oldfield, best known for the hugely successful Football Heroes books, visited St Mary's as part of the Key Stage 3 Enrichment Day.

Here are some of the stories produced by students who attended Matt's session:






Former Student delivers a computing master class!

As a department we continue to maintain links with former students who have studied A Level Computer Science at St Mary's and we celebrate their successes as they progress through their computer science careers.

Last week we had a visit from Micheal Nestor, a former pupil and one of many former St Mary's students who gone on to study Computer Science at university. Micheal is in his 2nd year Degree at Leeds University, and soon to start his internship with Bank of America.

During his visit to St Mary's last week, Micheal delivered a masterclass, to year 12 Computer Science students, on the use of "GIT" technology for version control as well as the use of Pyscript to embed python code in HTML pages. Some students have already decided to use some of these concepts in their up coming coursework projects.

The department overall has and continues to have a track record of churning out successful computer scientists and it is good to see some of them giving up their time to support our students. We have already lined up another exstudent to deliver a master class in Artificial Intelligence.

Before the Year 12 Bronze Duke of Edinburgh group embark on a three day and two night expedition in June we must practice a skill, partake in some sort of physical activity and volunteer in our free time. We must spend three months doing two of these options and six months on the other.

I have chosen to volunteer and learn a new skill for three months and spend six months playing a sport. For my skill I am learning to drive which allows me to have more freedom and gives my mum a rest from being my taxi!
