

Firstly, may I wish all in our community with an Irish connection a very happy St Patrick's Day! Perhaps there will be further celebrations tomorrow (Saturday) with the Ireland rugby team winning the Triple Crown and Grand Slam in the Six Nations tournament? We shall see...!

The key focus of Ofsted in their current inspection framework is a school's curriculum. It underpins the judgement on the quality of education provided to its students. The National Curriculum sets out much of the knowledge and skills that schools are expected to deliver, and these include the traditional academic pursuits that have been taught for decades. However, a fully rounded education must also include elements of personal development, or as we know it, PSHEE. The 'H' stands for health education, and strives to help our students to live healthy lives, free from behaviours that might prevent these. An important aspect of this work is educating our students about certain dangers to good health. One of these that we must acknowledge is prevalent in our modern society is the use of drugs. On Tuesday this week we dedicated the day to PSHE education on the subject of drugs, for all year groups. Leading sessions throughout the day was a returning visitor to St Mary's: Paul Hannaford. He tailored his presentations to individual year groups, but at the heart of each one was the sharing of his hard-hitting personal story from his early teens to present day. It followed his journey from happy, family orientated, football-loving boy to his introduction to illegal drugs, to addiction and gang involvement and subsequent prison sentences, through to his rehabilitation and current role as an educator. He is working towards his target of speaking to a million school children, warning of the dangers of drugs, and shares his experiences with a variety of audiences: primary school children, secondary school children and adults. He told me he had recently presented to a group of doctors. There are clearly different ways to try to educate children about this subject and some might feel that Paul's approach is too harsh.

However, I believe that it will have made a big impact on our students' understanding of the consequences of getting involved with drugs and those who promote their use and supply. Thanks to those parents/carers who came to St Mary's in the evening to listen to Paul's presentation. I hope they found it equally informative. If you were not able to attend, I would encourage you to talk to your child(ren) about Paul's presentation that they attended during the day. I hope you will agree it was a worthwhile contribution to our students' broader education.

On Tuesday evening, Paul also provided a Parent Workshop speaking about the government safeguarding policy, and the prevention and early identification of any issues as a direct result of addiction, gang crime and substance abuse.

## **Science Week with Careers Week**



### Student Report by Raul M, Biology Student, Year 12



Last week, we had Careers Week, an especially important period of time for Sixth Formers as they prepare for major careers decisions. Because of this, events such as this intrinsically offer an opportunity for students to not only discover potential paths they could take to get into the industries of their choice but also new industries which they might not have known

existed, with Science week. This meant that last week the school had many speakers come in to talk about their professional journey all the way from their GCSE's and A-Levels to their current profession, the talks ranging from across the different stages of drug development, polymer production as well as the role of IT in a multitude of fields. The majority of the talks revolved around Science due to the merge of Science Week with Careers Week but ones regarding apprenticeships also took place.



Dr Eileen Seward, a Medicinal Chemist, worked in drug discovery and she overviewed the difference and changes which are present between early and modern drug discovery, the impact her company (Charles River) had being involved in the majority of all drugs treating rare/orphan, oncological, neurological, blood and infectious diseases. She also explained the key skills required for her job, the different difficulties she experiences regularly having to develop drugs such as potential risks of the drug as well as those involved in the development of the drug and the key skills required for her job and the different countries she regularly visited as a part of her work.

Dr Dominic Tisi who is a Structural Biologist working with Astex spoke to us about the part he plays in designing the key molecules used to develop drugs which treat cancer. He told us about the difficulties of developing a drug which treats cancer explaining why it is so difficult to actually develop one as well as telling us the cause of cancer. He also works developing treatments for neurological diseases and explained the importance of treating these illnesses in their early stages whilst the damage caused is at its minimum.

Dr Elaine O'Prey recounted to us how her experience doing lab work allowed her to become a freelance medical writer and editor which allows her to work for herself and be more in control of what she does which provides her with a lot of freedom and flexibility. We learned of her day to day running her own company (Kestrel Consultancy Group LTD) as well as looking at actual scientific manuscripts she had worked on.





Dr David Ring, a polymer chemist who currently works as the global head of technology for Synthomer came and spoke about how setbacks do not mean the end of the road for you. He failed to get the grades required by his conditional offer at Oxford and so went to the University of Nottingham and now has a position of high seniority within a large company. His talk revolved majorly around university life working in labs, the details of him getting his PhD as well as his responsibilities within each of the many companies he worked at.

Lastly, Mr John Wright, having worked in IT roles in several different fields including BT, BBC, JP Morgan, the Home Office and the Metropolitan Police, laid out some of his most interesting jobs which included combating identity fraud in which he explained the different stages which took place in building software which could identify stolen identities and the difficulties and pressure involved.




In order to help with prayer during Lent we have introduced 'SiLent' - a two minute silence at midday, each day at school throughout Lent.

**Carnegies** NEW Carnegie Shadowing group starts next Thursday, 23<sup>rd</sup> March, 3.10-4.00pm in the library.


