


Anna S, Year 8

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


Geography Study Tour to Iceland

Talks for Year 12 by Ex St Mary's Students studying at Imperial College London and Durham University

We have been delighted to welcome back to St Mary's, ex-pupils currently at Durham or Imperial College London.



These universities are as competitive in entry as Oxford and Cambridge, with Durham offering a very similar university experience to Oxbridge, with it's beautiful ancient colleges, and Imperial offering a unique and vibrant London College experience at the UK's only Science and Technology University with state of the art equipment in stylish South Kensington, surrounded by the London museums, Royal College of Music, Royal Albert Hall and Hyde Park.

Here is some of the student feedback from the Year 12s who attended the talks:

On Wednesday 22nd March, ex-St Mary's student Joseph came in to talk to us about how he is coping with studying Maths and Statistics at Durham University and his university experience, how Durham is unusual in having the Oxford and

On Monday 27th March, we had two ex-St Mary's students Matthew and Lucy, who are studying Geology and Biomedical engineering, talked to us about their experiences at Imperial College London, student finances, their residences as well as the admissions process and how to make yourself stand out when you apply.

FCA Talk for Sixth Form Finance Students





Last week, we were fortunate to have St Mary's past pupil Michael McGloin come into school to speak to us about his role in the FCA (Financial Conduct Authority). Michael explained his own journey which started in Medicine and Law and now he is in the role of Associate in the Listing Transactions Department.



The FCA was formed after the 2007-08 financial crisis and was formally three separate departments. The FCA has three main objectives: to secure an appropriate degree of protection for consumers, to protect and enhance the integrity of the UK financial system and to promote effective competition in the interests of consumers. This is a big part of our Finance course so we found it useful to hear about it from an actual employee.

An outline of Michael's job is accepting or rejecting companies that want to enter the mainstream market by comparing them to a list of strict criteria to help keep the Financial market safe. He spoke about the options the FCA offers for after Year 13, such as apprenticeships and degree apprenticeships which can help someone to get onto the professional ladder.

We really enjoyed the talk and thank Michael and the FCA for giving up their time for the benefit of us.



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Uniform and Equipment

Uniform and Equipment for the start of the Summer Term

Uniform:

Please can we ask you to do a uniform check at home and ensure that your child has the correct school uniform for the start of the Summer term:



- * School Shoes **must be black leather**, low heels.
- Parents are urged not to send pupils to school in fashion shoes.
 Boots, trainers or canvas material footwear may not be worn in school.
- * All items of clothing must be marked clearly with pupil's name.

Do also take a moment before the new term starts to remind your child that:

- * No jewellery may be worn apart from a plain cross and chain, wrist watch and one pair of plain gold or silver stud earrings in the earlobes.
- * Please note that no jewellery of any value is to be worn.
- * "Smart" watches are not permitted due to safeguarding issues.
- * For safety reasons, long hair should be tied back, not up.
- Extreme hairstyles e.g. tinted or dyed hair are not acceptable. Any and every extreme haircut, as judged by the Head Teacher, specifically those with shaven sections contrasting other sections of longer, scissor cut hair are not permitted.
- * All hair accessories must be navy blue or black.
- * Make-up, fake tan and nail varnish and other noticeable appearance altering treatments e.g. eyebrow treatments, fake lashes must not be worn.
- * The use of nail extensions are not permitted due to health and safety concerns.



Equipment:

As ever, students are responsible for having their own personal equipment every lesson. This includes multiple pens, pencils, eraser, sharpener, ruler as well as all of the other specialist equipment required. It is essential that every student remembers to bring them in on a daily basis and Form Tutors will continue to do the usual daily checks of uniform and equipment.

Many students aspire to be an Engineer. But the question I ask in response is, "what type of Engineer?". Let's explore the Engineering possibilities

£29,000 - £60,000 average UK Salary Chemical Engineering Chemical Engineers design and manufacture materials and products using scientific principles from chemistry, biology, math and physics. They can work with microorganisms, food, pharmaceuticals and fuels. Chemical engineers research and design the machines, chemicals and activities which help create stuff from raw materials.

Civil Engineering

£24,000 - £80,000 average UK Salary

Civil Engineers plan and manage building projects including the intricate details of constructing transportation systems, dams, bridges, tunnels, roads, airports, water supply systems and buildings. A great deal of civil engineering uses the application of physics and maths to understand the stability of different types of structures.

Mechanical Engineering £22,000 - £55,000 average UK Salary

Mechanical engineers have the skill of designing machinery and components including technical drawings, statistics, mechatronics, and fluid mechanics. Mechanical engineers usually work with machinery and are responsible for improving existing mechanical technology and designing new machinery. Careers include manufacturing, theme park ride design and robotics.

Electrical Engineering £20,000 - £60,000 average UK Salary

Electrical Engineers work with a variety of systems, devices and components from power stations to microchips. There are several categories to work in such as; batteries, motors, power generation, telecommunications, video, audio and many more. You don't need a degree to get into electrical engineering, you can become a technician.
