### How can we all be a St. Mary's Catholic School leader?

#### Mr Johnston—Headteacher

My first week as Headteacher has been a busy one! On Monday, I led assemblies for the whole school and talked about leadership, what I would like for each student in their time at the school on the '7 year journey', our values as a community and how students, and parents, can have their voices heard as I shape the development plan to make this school even better!

The way we, in a Catholic school in particular, view leadership is that the primary focus as leaders is to enable others to flourish. That will be my main role as Headteacher – but this isn't a one-person job – we are all relying on many others in our school community to be leaders: teachers, all staff and volunteers, parish priest to name just a few. Your role as parents, as you guide your children and shape their character is a leadership role; enabling them to flourish. We all look for spiritual leadership – from the example of Christ and the Gospel values to guide us. Jesus is the ultimate example. In Mark (chapter 10) it says "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." A true leader not only serves those being led, the degree of such service is self-sacrifice – a theme we have been reflecting on over this Easter period. In Jesus' case, it led to his death by crucifixion on behalf of others.

St. Mary's was founded by a small group of nuns in 1896 who came to Bishop's Stortford because they identified, at the time, a gap. The gap they saw was that poor girls in this area were being deprived of an education. It wasn't an easy leadership task, and they were given opportunities to go to other areas where their task would have been much more straightforward – but they persevered. They battled against the odds and set up this school. A lot has changed over the years since then, but I would like to think that some of their original grit, their leadership and determination remains, woven into the fabric of the school. This should both inspire and, hopefully, rub off on us during our time here.

In that spirit, I set the students a challenge, to reflect on how they might be considered a leader, or what opportunities there are to be a servant leader in their lives. How can each of us enrich the lives of others over the next term to be a true St. Mary's Catholic School leader?

Our school values underpin everything that we do, providing us with strong foundations for all we strive to accomplish: So what do they mean for us?

**Love** means Love for Christ and for one another, as peacemakers, made in the image of God – and we should treat each other as such. We can demonstrate this by kindness to others, being quick to forgive and by showing that we care.

**Respect** can be demonstrated by being calm, smart, polite, purposeful and prayerful. We show respect by having high expectations of ourselves and each other – caring for our community and all creation.

And if we get all of that right, it will mean that our students can Flourish academically, artistically, physically, culturally and spiritually. 'Flourishing' is not a destination – I doubt in life any of us will ever feel like we have got everything right and exactly where we would like it to be – although there will be milestones along the way for the students – such as end of year exams, a fantastic piece of artwork, winning a sports match as part of a team, visiting exciting places or finding peace in prayer or reflective thoughts. I consider the 'Flourish' value more as a journey, demonstrated by actively engaging school, and life in general. Having pride in all that is achieved, and you can do.

#### **Easter Sunday Mass**

On Easter Sunday we had the trust mass in which all the groups that had travelled from all over the world with their VIPs joined up in one church for a very special Easter Sunday Mass. It was organised by a group from Merseyside in the UK. It was a joyous experience and was one of my favourite experiences out of the whole week. It was a marvellous thing to see hundreds of helpers and VIPs joining together in song and prayer, which is what the Catholic Church is really about. The atmosphere was continuously lively, and it was nice to see our very own VIPs, no matter how old, having fun and enjoying themselves. During the Homily there was a special performance from the Merseyside group, and it really livened the mass. As someone who normally goes to mass on Easter Sunday, this was a suitable alternative! Pure joy could be felt from anywhere in the huge room and during all songs, it was never silent. You could barely hear yourself sing! And of course, at the end of the well known HCPT song was sung. To be honest it took me a few days to get used to (and enjoy!) this song but when I did, I really understood how special it is. Everyone joined in this song, actions and all. It summarises the story of Noah's arc and it is sung at every HCPT mass. Almost like it is a universal language, bringing together people from all countries. This mass showed me that there are other VIPs out there having as much fun and being cared for as much as the four we took on the trip with us, which made me very happy.



### **Torchlight Procession**

Every evening, once night has fallen on the town, thousands of pilgrims (sick and abled) gather to walk and sing with flaming torches in their hand, from the Grotto of Apparitions to the esplanade of the Rosary Basilica. Furthermore, a statue of the Virgin is carried by the pilgrims to lead the Marian procession. This is then followed by participants walking in groups behind their pilgrimage banners, Across group 2301 being one of them!

During the procession, I was responsible for pushing one of our VIPs called Katie who I was able to build a special bond with during the pilgrimage. Being given the responsibility to look after the VIPs is a great privilege, although it also comes with its hardships such as trying not to hit people's ankles or struggling to conserve your energy for your arms and legs!

As the pilgrims walked around with their candles praying in their own languages, I couldn't help but admire how language barriers unites the community together rather than separating it. In fact, the variety of languages ranged from Polish, Italian, Spanish, French to English! Adding onto this, the procession couldn't have ended in any better way than

with the traditional 'Rise and Shine' HCPT song! We've sang and danced to this song so many times throughout our pilgrimage that I will never be able to forget it!

Thinking of the correct words to describe the experience and the beauty of the torchlight procession is impossible as it's a magical, inspirational moment that you have to witness yourself. Whether you take part or just watch, it is always touching to witness this 'magic' moment that brings people together from the four corners of the earth.



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# **Lourdes Pilgrimage 2023**

#### Lourdes Pilgrimage 2023 -

Ella informs us of what she has learnt from the nurses of the specific care needs of the VIP's and how she helped learn from the nurses how to deliver the expert care required.

On the trip, I was fortunate enough to learn from two nurses as well as from one of the VIP's grandad who showed me Cally's medical needs.

Cally is a 17 year old boy with dystonia which is a neurological movement disorder. This meant that he would experience involuntary muscle movements and contractions as the electrical signals that his body would send to his brain would get mixed up. For example, if he wanted to lift his right arm up, his left foot might go up instead. Due to this, Cally has a box inside of him that is connected through wires to his brain. This box helps to unscramble the electrical signals and is charged weekly for 15 minutes by placing a charger on his stomach just above the box where it will charge wirelessly.

In addition to this, Cally also has a collapsed oesophagus so is unable to eat hard food. He therefore has a percutaneous endoscopic gastrostomy feeding tube that goes through the skin and the stomach wall which is held open by a balloon and his food and medicine is given to him through this. I was able to use syringes to give Cally his medicine and flush it down with water via the tube that links to his stomach. He also has a food supplement that contains all of the vital minerals, vitamins and food that a person would need which is also fed to him through a tube which I was also able to do.

Two of the VIP's who came on the trip are also unable to walk and therefore had to be hoisted into and out of their wheelchairs and their beds. I was also able to assist and witness this several times which was a great experience.

One of the VIP's who also came on the trip was a 22 year old lady called Katy who has epilepsy and has tremors so was constantly shaking all the time due to her medical condition and needs. Due to this, unfortunately she is unable to do things such as eating or walking by herself. Throughout the week, I fed her breakfast, lunch and dinner as well as sometimes feeding the other VIP, Mary.

Overall, the trip was an amazing experience and it gave me an insight of the difficulties and needs of other people, enabling me to have a greater understanding of what their lives are like.

We had a tasty turkey sandwich with lettuce and crisps and a drink of our choice and once we were all full of energy we were allowed to go and explore. We set off with two of our VIPs Katie and Anne stopping outside a gift shop in which Conrad bought a walking stick. Although we all laughed at him for buying it he was the one who had the last laugh when Miss McHugh dared us to cross the river in our bare feet as penance! So me Lily, Conrad and Matthew thought this was a great and easy thing to do since it was a

boiling hot day and we wanted to cool down, but we were so wrong. I don't think any of us have ever felt that much pain from water. It was that cold that we were screaming running across it. Despite the initial pain we all thought that our feet afterwards had never felt that smooth before. On our way back from the river we decided that we hadn't had enough of the cold and bought ourselves an ice cream each. While we ate our ice cream, we spotted a pen of horses and donkeys who looked starved, so we fed them, and we were even able to pet them as they had become friendly with us. Overall, I think this day trip to Gavarnie was my favourite part of the whole Lourdes trip it was just such an amazing and funny experience that would love to have again.

### Our VIPs and their unique needs

It was a pleasure travelling to Lourdes with the Across team and our VIPs. This year, we took four VIPs (Cally, Katie, Anne and Mary) who had unique needs and disabilities to experience this pilgrimage.

Cally has a narrow oesophagus and has other complex health conditions which makes him wheelchair dependent. However, Cally has a big imagination and was able to come up with stories that combined Thomas the Tank Engine, Harry Potter and the Octonauts. Katie has a rare form of epilepsy and has some mobility issues. However, Katie was able to fit in to our group of young helpers and it was fun talking to her. Like Katie, Anne has mobility issues. But she was also nice to talk to. Mary is diagnosed with dystonia caused by chronic arthritis which left her wheelchair dependent and a range of other complex physical health conditions. However, Mary told us of her interesting history, from serving in the RAF for five years to having a world record of carrying the Olympic torch in 2012 and becoming a champion for disability awareness and a government advisor.

Our role was to help our VIPs enjoy their pilgrimage to Lourdes. This included pushing their wheelchairs from our hotel to the sanctuary in Lourdes, feeding them and entertaining them. The Jumbulance provided equipment to satisfy the needs of our VIPs like a bed with storage for their medication and lift for easy access for getting on and off the Jumbulance.

I think it's important to care for people with unique needs as it helps us gain an understanding of what it's like to be limited in life because of health challenges. This pilgrimage with our VIPs has taught me a lot about caring for other people, especially those who are in need of help.

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# **Iceland Study Trip**

#### Day 1

On 25<sup>th</sup> March, we all arrived at school at 1:30am. Tired but exuberated, we boarded the coach that brought us to Heathrow Airport. As we approached Keflavík International Airport after a near three-hour flight, we were greeted by vast mountain ranges carpeted by a sheet of white (which we would later learn were ice caps formed during the last Ice Age!). After everything was sorted, we got on our coach and met our tour guides—Claire and Jen. A short drive later, we arrived at Miðlína, the Bridge Between Two Continents. Since Iceland is situated up on a divergent boundary between the Eurasian tectonic plate and the North American tectonic plate, here we were able to graduate from reading about them from the text-books to standing between the two plates and seeing it right before our very eyes. It was truly mind blowing that we were



walking right between two structures that housed whole countries and millions of people on top. Then, we headed to the Blue Lagoon, of which everyone was very excited about. As we were driving, the plumes of steam from the hot springs could be seen from a mile away, which added to the atmosphere of anticipation. Claire also gave us some context on how the Blue Lagoon was accidentally created, as well as the chemical makeup of the waters that contribute towards the water's hydrating and revitalising abilities. After some preparation, we all submerged into the steaming, turquoise blue but turbid waters of the blue lagoon. Immediately our skin softened and soothed in the pleasant 40-degree water. In the 2 hours we were there, we enjoyed a face clay mask, and a free drink that came with our

admission. As our session came to an end, we were all quite reluctant to leave. Following a 50 minute drive to Reykjavík, we checked into our hotel rooms and had a little break. We then took the 20-minute walk into the city centre. Along the way, Claire introduced us to the numerous art installations and statues around Reykjavík. One which was particularly memorable for me (also being a history student) was a fragment of the Berlin Wall, and the building where the Reykjavík Summit of 1986 was held, where the US President Ronald Reagan and Soviet Union leader Mikhail Gorbachev met during the Cold War. We furthered along the harbour and reached the city centre, where we were introduced to a gigantic 3-D map of Iceland and the landmarks nearby. Such were the governmental buildings and Hallgrímskirkja, a Parish church standing 74.5 metres tall which we saw into the distance. After a quick tour of the city, we were allowed some free time to wander around the area, purchasing souvenirs and window shopping. Later, as the sun was setting, we walked back to the hotel. We were all very worn out at the end of the day but excited for what was to come over the next few days.



#### Day 2

After an average night's sleep, I can't say the first thing I wanted to do was wake up at 7am. However, we did it and I'm so glad we did, because the first thing we did on our second day was the Hellisheidi Power Station! Despite being half awake and dreary-eyed, I found the exhibition very informative and interesting. Did you know that Iceland runs 100% on renewable energy? Or that 70% of that energy is made from geothermal energy? Because I surely didn't until I heard it in the talk we had. The exhibition itself was very interactive and gave us life sized models of components, such as the pipes and insulation used to pump the water into Reykjavík and other areas in Iceland. Our next stop was a crater, however not like



what you think. The way it had been formed was through lava spewing out of the earth and slowly layering on top of itself to form a mound around the original spewing point. Underneath the snow, the 'soil' was a coppery colour, because of the oxidised iron. The walk around the crater was slippery, however we survived and moved on to our next destination, which was the Gullfoss Waterfall. Beautiful does not begin to describe this waterfall. The Gullfoss Waterfall was a stunning layered waterfall situated within a gorge. The waterfall itself, especially with the snow surrounding it, was absolutely breathtaking to say the least. After admiring the waterfall and discussing its origins, we were allowed to wander around for a bit before we were to leave for our next place. After a quick bus ride, we arrived at our next destination which were the geysers. Not only were these amazing, and sometimes a bit heart-stopping if you didn't know it

was coming, but they were interesting to learn about, like the 'schedule' they 'explode' on is all natural and without human intervention at all! I loved watching the steam shoot up into the sky and plume out, waiting for it all to start again! After the geysers came a walk around the original site of Iceland's parliament. Did you know that Iceland was the first ever recorded

country to have a parliament? This area was breath-taking... the views were stunning, like something straight out of a story book. My words cannot express how beautiful this area was. The history behind the area was very intriguing as well, and I was hooked on every word. Still... we aren't done... because then came mass. This had to be one of the most peaceful, most thought-provoking, most beautiful masses I've ever been to. Everyone of all ages was so united in their singing and praying in such an intricate church that you couldn't help but try and join in as much as possible. After all that, we got back to our hotel... but it doesn't end there... that night was a quiz night where the trip split into groups to try and gain points to win a bag of skittles each at the end. Finally, after all that we could shut our eyes and go to sleep, ready for another fun-packed day tomorrow.



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# **Iceland Study Trip**

#### Day 3

On the third day, we had a long road trip across the south of Iceland to see some incredible waterfalls, beaches and glaciers, which were mind-blowing to say the least. We visited the Reynisfjara black sand beach along the south coast first which showed us amazing geographical examples of basalt columns as well as sea stacks. This really helped to demonstrate the coastal processes and put the knowledge I had learnt in the classroom into a life-sized example! We did also stop off for a look at the stunning mountains, but quickly had to return to the coach as the wind nearly blew us all over! We could even feel the coach wobbling as we hopped back on for the next part of the journey, but it was quite exhilarating! We also took a short break at a service station (which all tourists would use when journeying along the south coast, due to the extreme sparse landscapes!) where we picked up some essential spacks (to keep up those energy levels of course.)



Next on our adventure through Iceland, we saw the Sólheimajökull glacier, which showed us how human actions and global warming have taken effect on the natural world, causing erosion and the retreat of the glacier. It was even larger than I could have ever imagined though, I still cannot quite believe the sheer scale of the volume of ice in one place, despite its retreat back up the valley! On the journey to the two final natural locations of the trip, our incredibly knowledgeable tour guide, Claire, told us sagas from Iceland's history, which were so informative and interesting, and completely new to me! To



say we learnt a lot from this trip is an understatement! We also visited two waterfalls on our final day: Skógafoss and Seljalandsfoss, which were just breath-taking. Fortunately we had the weather on our side too, even catching sight of a beautiful rainbow across both waterfalls and stunning icicles (for this reason we could not venture behind the waterfalls; I'd rather not become skewered into an ice kebab on my last day of the trip!). The whole base of Skógafoss was frozen over as well, which apparently was quite a rare sight from this waterfall, and made it even more special! We finished the trip with an exciting game of bowling in the evening, which was the perfect way to end such an incredible experience. Now you can't find all that awe and wonder in a textbook!!

Each night we headed out to the harbour front in hopes of catching the aurora borealis. Although all attempts were in vain, we weren't heartbroken, as this provided even more reason to return in future years, and adventure even further into Iceland's natural beauty and history; for the astonishing sights of Iceland had truly won us over.




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# **RE Department News...**

Share your actions on Earth Day with your Geography teacher to be rewarded with house points.



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# **Art Department**


Miss Nairn would like to congratulate 8D on the completion of their final pieces for this term.

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# What is Vaping?

#### What is vaping?

Vapes are electronic devices designed to allow people to inhale nicotine in a vapour. Using a vape is known as vaping. Vapes are also available without nicotine. In the UK, the NHS recommends vapes for adults to use as an aid to quit smoking tobacco which carries far greater health risks. Vaping is not recommended for non-smokers or young people.

There are some concerns around certain vape products not meeting UK safety standards (ASH 2022). Vaping, though less harmful than smoking tobacco, exposes its users to some toxins that can cause unpleasant health effects, they also often contain nicotine which is an addictive substance that evidence suggests adolescents are more sensitive to (NHS, ASH 2022). It is also important to acknowledge that clinicians do not know the long term health effects of vaping at this time.

Like cigarettes, vapes are age restricted products and therefore it is illegal for shops and other retailers to sell vaping items including vaping equipment such as liquids to people under the age of 18. It is also against the law to buy vapes on behalf of anyone under the age of 18. It is, therefore, clear that young people under the age of 18 should not be purchasing or be in possession of alternative nicotine products such as vapes.



#### What does a vape look like?

Vapes can come in a variety of different forms, shapes, and sizes. Some common styles of vapes include ones which look like a thick pen or highlighter pen. These devices are usually very small and can be concealed on a person and therefore can be missed.

#### **Education and rules at St Mary's**

We will continue to educate all of our young people regarding the health risks of vaping, the significantly greater risks of tobacco smoking and the law through form time activities, PSHEE and assemblies. Pupils are reminded on a regular basis of our school behaviour policy and the list of prohibited items.

If a student is found in possession of a prohibited item such as a Vape, a strong sanction will always be applied

#### What can parents do?

Know and understand the risks presented by smoking, electronic cigarettes and vapes. Talk to your child openly about these risks to ensure that they are well informed and have clear guidance that these products are to be avoided.

#### What steps can I take if my child has used electronic cigarettes/vapes?

Some young people may unfortunately choose to vape and we encourage you to talk to your GP if you are concerned about this.

#### NEU Strike Action 27th April 2023

You will be aware that following negotiations with the DFE all four teaching unions have rejected the proposed pay and funding offer that was put forward. The reasons for that is that unions felt that the offer failed to address long-term pay erosion, the teacher recruitment and retention crisis, or provide enough funding for schools to be able to afford the substantial increase in costs over the recent period of time which is causing many schools to have to make cuts to their provision.

The NEU have announced two further strike days, the first of which is Thursday 27th April. Whilst not every teacher at St Mary's is a member of the NEU, experience over the previous strike days has shown that there are a significant number. The safe running of the school depends on an adequate number of staff on site to provide the necessary supervision of its students.

On this occasion we have decided that the school will continue to prioritise attendance for those students taking public examinations in the coming months so will remain open for Year 11 and Year 13 students.

#### For all other students:

- Teachers (who are not members of the NEU) will be scheduling live lessons on Teams for at least 50% of each lesson, setting independent follow-up work for the remaining scheduled time.
- The school day will follow the normal school timings.
- The planned Year 12 Oxford University trip will still go ahead
- . Students who are cast members of the school production of 'Frozen the Musical' will be in rehearsals all day

There is one further strike day planned at present (this situation may change and other unions may also ballot members on strike action), on Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> May. Details about how St Mary's intends to conduct learning on that day will be provided nearer the time.
