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#### **Important Safeguarding Information for Parents**

#### Edibles - Sweets infused with Cannabis Oil

**Dear Parents** 

Schools have been made aware that students and young people are being offered edibles or sweets infused with THC or Cannabis on some social media platforms. This is particularly apparent in Bishops Stortford and the local areas in the last few weeks. The sweets can be purchased very cheaply and look and are marketed like regular sweet products. You will see some photos of packets to demonstrate the concern.

As the amount of cannabis in the sweets can vary greatly and other harmful drugs may be added, the effects of consuming edibles are unpredictable and it can be easy to accidentally take a larger dose. It is known that edibles take between 1-3 hours to have an effect because food is absorbed into the bloodstream differently. Which means young people may end up consuming larger amounts of the sweets if they don't think it has worked. Thereby making overdosing with edibles a great risk!

The risks when consumed may include: elevated heart rates, increased anxiety or panic attacks, fainting, uncontrolled vomiting or hallucinations. To help protect all our young people, we ask that you monitor sweets packets or edibles that may be given to your child, you look out for unusual signs or symptoms and seek immediate medical advice if your child is in distress.

We will continue to inform, advise and guide our students through PSHEE lessons, assemblies and tutor sessions; and we trust that you will not hesitate to get in touch with us if you have questions or comments related to the above concerns.

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


### **Library News...**

There are brand new copies of the books for young adults in the school library now. Please encourage your children to come and explore these exciting new titles.





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#### **Hay Fever Season!**

Between May and July, during the traditional growing season, trees and plants create more pollen, and this, together with warmer more humid temperatures and winds, can bring about a spike in our hay fever symptoms.





Hay fever affects almost 10 million people in England, of all ages. This equates to almost one in four adults and one in ten children.

If your child has hay fever, please can you make sure they have had their antihistamine medication before coming to school. Students can bring spare medication to the Student Hub. First aid trained staff will administer non-prescription medication when a parent/carer has provided a written letter of consent, and the medication is provided in a labelled container, with instructions for dosage. All medicines are stored safely in the Student Hub.

Not only is an "influencer" an increasingly powerful role in the digital age, but it's also become a desirable career goal for many young people – an enjoyable way to gain international fame and a gateway to financial success.

Do you need a Degree? Yes. To become a Neurologist, you would first need a Medical Degree which will take a minimum of 5 years. You would then complete 2 years of foundation training in UK hospitals.

To become fully qualified to the highest level, this would take a minimum of an additional 7 years
