This week has been the start of our summer retreat programme for our Year 7 students. After some torrential rain on the first morning we still managed to have a fun, thought-provoking and spiritual day.


The retreats are based at Windhill Churches' Centre, which is a fantastic space, and during our time together students were able to attend mass at St. Joseph's, where we celebrated the feast of St. Alban, a Roman soldier who protected and hid a Catholic priest who was being persecuted, and then receive the Holy Eucharist. Fortuitously, Fr Peter's homily was a very useful segue into the theme of the retreat that was about "Young people demanding and standing up for change". During the retreat we identified numerous injustices in our world and then spoke about why and how we should campaign to support these causes, we were also able to utilise St Alban as an example of someone standing up for what is right. At lunchtime, the weather had improved and so each form was able to have their shared lunch outside. It was fantastic to see how all students looked after each other. In the afternoon we then spoke about Pope Francis' "Laudato si" – his letter to every person on

our Earth, to call for change and protection of our common home - Earth. Students watched a video and we had time to discuss the key questions and information raised throughout, this led on to some very challenging questions about what we may need to sacrifice in order to live more simply and sustainably.

Please do speak to your son/daughter about the retreat and "Laudato si", and hopefully as a family you may be guided by the Holy Spirit to decide on what changes/ sacrifices you may be able to make to live more simply, in order to care for our Common Home.

Winners announced!



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
The winner of this year's Carnegie Prize was announced on Wednesday 21st June. The prize is awarded by a panel of Librarians to the best book written for young adults, and this year they chose 'The Blue Book of Nebo' by Manon Steffan Ros. It's a unique story (translated from the original Welsh) about a mother and son who are living alone after a mysterious disaster has hit their home town.

Recommended for readers in Year 8 and above, because of some more mature content, it is a story that will stay with you long after you read it.

The Shadower's Choice award is voted for by the students in schools across the country who have read the Carnegie Prize shortlist. This year's winner was 'I Must Betray You' by Ruta Sepetys. Our Shadowing group at St Mary's chose it too. It's a gripping story, based on real events in Romania in the 1980s.

GLOBAL SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

St Mary's Catholic School Geography Department

Warwick University hold a Global Sustainable Development Competition each year.


This year students were tasked with creating either an essay, podcast, photo or artistic exploration to answer one of three questions posed about sustainable development.

We held an internal competition of which the standard from all the students was amazing; resulting in three winners. Gabrielle had a winning entry with her digital artwork, which explores the idea that sustainable products are often

too expensive for ordinary people and that we need the support of the government to be able to make sustainable choices for the products we buy more easily. **Oliver and Tobias were also winners for their collaborative essay,** which demonstrated thorough research of the Sustainable Development Goals and links to contemporary Geography.

There were also highly commended entries from Corey with his detailed essay discussing the challenges faced by people in different locations and great ideas for overcoming these challenges. There were also some great collaborations to produce podcasts. Well done to Laurenzo and Clinton for their excellent collaboration with great local knowledge about sustainability. Also to Ben and Harrison with well-presented and carefully chosen images and good analysis of geographical concepts. Amber and Gene also made a great collaboration, with thorough local knowledge of sustainability and thoughtful discussion of opinions.

Well done Year 12, the Geography Department is very impressed with all of your entries and wait with anticipation to see how you did in the Warwick University competition. Good luck!



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


Penny Box Scheme at St Mary's



Period Poverty is a worldwide issue and affects millions of women and girls who struggle to afford or access safe menstrual protection.

In the UK, it is estimated that currently over 137,000 children across the UK have missed school days due to period poverty.




According to various studies, teenage girls need help:

- * 25% of girls have had to make do without period products during their period.
- * 1 in 9 girls have missed school or college because they could not afford period products.
- * 36% of girls said there is a lack of education over matters such as periods and contraception. In fact, 17% say that a lack of education is the biggest barrier facing young girls at school today.
- * 59% of students make up a lie or alternative excuse to miss school such as faking colds or headache.
- * 28% of young women (aged 16-24) who have had a period in the last 12 months report having avoided or missed school, college or university in the last year because of their periods.

"Ask to see Miss Penny" or ask for the "Penny Box".

The 'Penny Box' scheme provides access to products (tampons and pads) if, for example, pupils cannot afford period products or have forgotten to bring them to school.

Nobody should be held back because of their period.
