
Congratulations to our Award Winners!

It was my privilege to host the annual Presentation Evening last night in the school hall, alongside all the teaching staff, parents and award winners from the academic year 2022-2023.








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Anti-Bullying Week at St Mary's



Where do you want to go and what do you want to do when you leave St Mary's?


I want to acquire an apprenticeship relating to film and TV, and if I am unable to do this I want to go to university to study film making. I will definitely keep art in my life as a hobby.

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




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The season of Advent is about to begin!

Advent starts on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day. It marks the start of the Church's new liturgical year, and the Church shifts into a new Lectionary Cycle for Sundays, with 2023-24 returning to Cycle B, the Gospel of St. Mark.



In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus.



The liturgical vestments priests wear during the season are purple, matching the candles lit on each Sunday of Advent. Purple is a colour typically associated with penance. The exception is the third Sunday — Gaudete Sunday — when priests wear pink vestments — the colour of rejoicing.

Sunday, 3rd December, First Sunday of Advent

On the First Sunday of Advent, we light the first candle, which is the symbol of HOPE. It is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It represents the expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah.


