Whose crops have failed and go without food Who go to Food Banks to feed their families

Whose water is unclean

Whose water sources are drying up due to human activity

For the strangers -

Who are new to our country and feel unwelcome

Who are lonely in our community

Who suffer ill health with not enough medicine or help

Who suffer from anxiety or depression

Because whatever we do to them, we do it to you.

Advent is a time of waiting and anticipation of the Nativity and the celebration of God's love for the world. We are reflecting on this in school through a Living Prayer Wall in each form room, with Chaplaincy representatives leading the prayer life of their form class and dedicating prayers to a range of situations and people across the world.

The Catholic Church has a special vocation to take care of the poor and oppressed. We share this mission through our charity work, particularly in this season through the support for the Caritas Giving Advent Calendar, asking members of our community to bring in items of food and personal care to donate to those in need. We are collecting for the Cardinal Hume Centre in Westminster Food Bank Appeal and will be taking the donations we receive to the centre ahead of the Christmas holidays. Full details of this appeal are on the next pages, and I encourage you to take part, if you can, to ensure that as many people as possible can feel supported at what can be a difficult time of year for some.

## **Advent Giving Calendar**

Advent is a special season in the Church's year when we prepare to celebrate the coming of Christ. However, with the cost of living crisis, many in our communities are facing

This Advent Giving Calendar is designed for you to use this season as a time to think about those who might need some extra support this Christmas. You can follow along each day and make up a food parcel that you generously donate to a food project in your church or school, or one local to you.

#### How to use the Advent Giving Calendar

- Ask your church or school if they run a food bank, food collection, a community meal, or any other kind of food outreach, and if they would like some donations.
- If you are not sure, contact us at Caritas and we can help you find a food project near you. Our contact details can be found at the bottom of this page.
- Each day in Advent, find the corresponding snowman on the calendar, which will tell you what you need to buy to add to your collection. You could team up with others too, and share the collecting between you.
- Take the collected items to your chosen food project. You might want to take them in early, to make sure they are there in time to help people this Christmas.
- Join the Advent Giving Calendar community online. Spread the word about the calendar and share photos of your collecting on social media.

#### Use the hashtag: #AdventGlvIngCalendar and tag us:

- Give what you can, or donate something that you would like to receive.
- Ask your local food project what other help they may need. Perhaps you could volunteer this winter, or spread the word about what they do.

#### If you need support with food

Please do speak to your church or school and they can tell you what support there is in your area. You can contact Caritas too.

#### Who made this calendar?

This calendar was created by Caritas Westminster, the social outreach charity of the Diocese of Westminster. One of our areas of work is to support parishes and schools that provide food to communities. There are over 300 food projects in the diocese, including food banks and pantries, food collections, food sharing and giving, and community meal initiatives. Almost all are run by volunteers, working tirelessly to end poverty and create connection and community through food. Use this calendar to help support their efforts this winter.

Thank you for offering to help those in need who rely on the support of The Cardinal Hume Centre Foodbank. Based in the heart of Westminster, for over 30 years it has been providing a lifeline to local vulnerable families. Our donations come from generous individuals, families, parishes, and schools, and we need a steady supply. Opening hours are from 10am-4pm.

It is difficult for individuals and families who are already managing on extremely tight budgets to afford nutritionally balanced food items throughout the year and especially in the winter. I in 3 children in our area are classified as living in poverty, with many families and adults considered homeless, and vulnerable.

Here is a list of suggested items. Food parcels are great, and work best when they contain non-perishables that can make easy meals or simply ease the budget for a family in poverty. Basic / value priced items are perfectly fine. Some people are in fuel poverty, so they sometimes like things that can be eaten cold or with minimal boiling (some only have a kettle). Note: \* indicates an item we use the most.

What is very useful is low-value gift cards (physical, or digital), perhaps £5, £10 or £20 for Sainsbury's Tesco, etc. These give people the dignity to choose items they most need, especially if we don't have stock. Digital vouchers enable us to email the code to someone who is unbale to get into the Centre.

Unusual items (octopus, truffle oil, etc), fresh milk, refrigerated or frozen food, bleach, opened/part-used items, out-of-date items, unlabelled food, packages that do not list ingredients, items where the labels are not in English, homemade items, cracked jars, catering-sized items (hard to carry them home!).

All assemblies will be starting with the above information to reiterate the support and signpost student's.


#### Is bullying a problem at your school?

Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> December 2023 marks the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and we thought it fitting that



students should be able to reflect on this milestone through consideration of an issue, which is still, sadly, evident today: racism. Students were asked to explain why they stand up to racism, with reference to Catholic Social teaching.



Mmasichukwu I 7T is the KS3 winner with a beautiful poster on the theme. They have reflected on the Christian belief that we are all made in God's image and have taken care over the presentation of the poster.



Christabel E 10B is the KS4 winner. The speech is heartfelt and original and reflects on what it means to stand up to racism.

#### I STAND UP TO RACISM - CHRISTABEL E 10B

Imagine a world where the color of your skin doesn't define who you are within, or become a reason to be a vulnerable victim of an ignorant mindset from another human. A world where the love of mothers reaches beyond the graves of their children, their innocent children whose lives were selfishly taken by hearts hardened with hatred. Racism. Imagine a world without it. When society rejects you, who do you turn to? Where do you go? Standing up to racism isn't just about watching that one movie, participating in that lesson about slavery, paying attention in that black history month assembly; it's far beyond than that. More than having colored friends to tell you about how it really is. A group of us walking together is 'intimidating', but walking by yourself makes you notice all the things you try to ignore. The old white woman who clutches her purse in that lift, the shop keeper that follows you around as you shop, or simply the looks of disgust as you walk down the road. Suddenly I feel out of place in. As if I don't belong. An anomaly.

Standing up to racism is living out day by day the words Catholic Social Teaching emphasizes, "Every form of social or cultural discrimination in fundamental personal rights on the grounds of sex, race, color, social conditions, language, or religion must be curbed and eradicated as incompatible with God's design." Afterall, the greatest commandment of all is to love the Lord your God with all your mind heart and soul, but how can you love God with a heart which despises others? How many arms of black mother's ache for the sons and daughters they'll never hold again? How can you say you love God but make others feel out of place, as if they don't belong.

An anomaly. Mother Theresa once said, "If you judge people, you have no time to love them". Standing up to racism is standing up to the change we are called to make as Christians. As humans. Imagine a world where the color of your skin doesn't define who you are within, I stand up to racism to make that world OUR reality.

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## **Inter House Christmas Card Competition**


# Shown below are the winners of the Inter House Christmas Card Competition!


