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Inspirational Maths Talk




Inspirational Maths Talk for Year 11, Year 12 and Year 13 students at Saffron Walden Hall

Student Report by Ezekiel, Year 13

Starting off the talk, guest speaker Alison Kiddle introduced the audience to the concept of micromorts: a unit that represents a one-in-a-million chance of death. We learned about the usefulness of small units for making approximations for risk. Examples given were travelling by train, car, and walking, of which trains were by far the safest. Conversely, the 'reward' part of the talk looks instead at the odds of winning the lottery. A paper was shown with the misleading title of 'You need 27 tickets to guarantee a win on the UK National Lottery' (November 2023), by David Cushing and David I Stewart. In it, we were taken through the method to win at least one prize (no matter how small) and the reasoning behind how it worked. From this, it was shown that luck-based events could be predicted given a large enough size or frequency.

The next section dealt with the maths involved with arcade video games, and how it can help us visualise mathematical concepts. Led by Matthew Scroggs, a game of 'Pacman' was show. Using an algorithm, a path was constructed to beat a level in the shortest distance possible, demonstrated through a recorded video. part of the demonstration was the 'screen-warping' shown in the game. The world that arises from this 'screen-warping' were better shown on another videogame, 'Asteroids'. An audience member played a recreation of 'Asteroids' on his website, displaying the weird properties of a world that wraps around on itself. We were shown the usefulness of considering these different worlds in map making, as a 3D shape can never truly be conveyed on a 2D surface. This means maps must be designed to make some details accurate, while sacrificing other aspects.


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
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Finally, speaker Colin Wright took us on a tour of the maths of juggling. What started off as an unrelated topic about pattern recognition soon moved on to how this could be used to make predictions. To illustrate this point, the audience was treated to a spectacular showing of juggling skills, and he highlighted the underlying patterns. This culminated in the audience deciding on the final juggling trick, using a pre-established diagram, to end off the talk.


























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Artist in Focus

I would say explore other artists work and different mediums to allow you to develop your personal style and skill. It takes a long time to find your creative voice and be confident with this.




















Sunday 17th December Third Sunday of Advent

The Third Sunday of Advent is also known as Gaudete Sunday. The word 'Gaudete' is derived from the Latin words 'gaudium', joy, and 'gaudeo', to rejoice or be glad.

On the Third Sunday of Advent we light the third candle, which is a symbol of JOY.

It is sometimes called the "Shepherds Candle", and is pink because rose is a liturgical colour for joy. The Third Sunday of Advent reminds us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy that the faithful have reached the midpoint of Advent.
