There are lots of plans for this Lenten period in school, some of these are outlined in the next few pages. God Bless.



We have our yearly Piano Recital coming up on 12th March and there are some spaces still available if you would like to perform a piece.



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Year 10 Trip to Cambridge



Year 10 Visit to Gonville and Caius College Cambridge Thursday 8th Feb 2024



Our ten lucky Year 10 students were not going to let the most atrocious weather dampen their spirits as we trudged through Cambridge in the cold and the rain! We were one of four Hertfordshire schools visiting for a special day just for Year 10s from Hertfordshire schools.

The admissions talk helped us all to realise that Year 10 is certainly not too early to start thinking about university courses, reading around subjects of interest, listening to podcasts, finding out which A Levels you might need, (for example, students expect you need Biology for Medicine, but in fact the compulsory science is Chemistry).

They also impressed upon students the importance of a really strong set of GCSEs. Top universities are looking for students who can motivate themselves to work really hard at ALL of their subjects and who can show commitment to their education over an extended period of time.

After lunch in the Harry Potter-style College dining hall, complete with large portrait of Stephen Hawking (who apparently insisted his had to be the largest!), we went to the Whipple Museum where we had workshop sessions which involved activities ranging from handling 450 year old medical books, through to giving ourselves minor electric shocks! For students like ours, studying Medicine Through Time as part of their GCSE History, this visit could not have been more apt, and it comes highly recommended to other interested Year10 Historians, perhaps as a day trip over half term.

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Accelerated Reader

Looking at the top ten AR groups, there has been a change in the number one spot, with 8B moving up from third, to overtake the Year 7 classes!


We have two more Year 8 classes in the top ten now, along with two Year 9 groups.

Matt Goodfellow is from Manchester and when he was 13 he wanted to become a rock star, but he became a Primary School teacher for 10 years instead. Then he started writing verse novels. We asked questions at the end of the speech and we enjoyed listening to his poems. Matt told us about his thoughts on SSE (Standard Spoken English) and he said everyone should be able to speak how they want, in their own way.

One student, Charlotte, wrote about the visit in the style of Matt's verse novel 'The Final Year' (copies available in the library):

13th of February 2024, we went to see an author who went by the name of Matt Goodfellow. He talked about poetry, and what he did for a living, the poems and stories he wrote and where his ideas come from.

He taught us about SSE, Standard Spoken English, how he disagreed with it, and what poetry can do.

Soon it was question time, and we asked away, about many different things, though soon it was time to go.


I will always remember the day, when Matt Goodfellow came to talk.

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Spring Internal Mock Examinations

EXAMS

Start SOON The November progress exams were an important milestone, allowing the students to gain valuable information about their achievement and learning at that point, and more importantly, areas they could continue to develop to realise additional examination success. The **February/March internal mock examinations** offer the same opportunities; that of gauging progress and preparing for the final push towards May. As you will be aware, May 2024 is the beginning of the summer examination series and the culmination of five years of study at St. Mary's.

In order to best support your son/daughter, each subject will be providing lists of helpful topics that would be worth revising prior to the examinations, so that they can show the progress they have made and have confidence that they can replicate this in examination conditions. It is also worth remembering that these examinations, while they are important and will yield valuable information, are a stepping stone on the way to the final examinations in the summer. Fully prepared, students will feel they can manage their time, some of the stresses, the balance between work and rest as well as ensuring they show themselves to the best of their ability. Preparation can include having the correct equipment, knowing timetables, being on time and feeling that they are ready to do their best as they have revised. All students will gain confidence from showing they have progressed, and all students will feel prepared for the summer if they manage these mocks well.

To this end we ask for your support; please ensure that your son/daughter has a place to revise, help them with their time management, a sensible sleep schedule and help ensure they have their equipment. Each morning, please remind them that we want them to show their best – if together they can achieve these things, the feedback they get will be especially valuable.

It is important to remember the parable of the talents in the Gospel of St. Matthew 25:14-30; we would like to see all of our students make the most of their talents and succeed where we know they can, so we encourage them to not bury any talents until the final 'real' examinations.
